Dear DePaul Colleagues,

Given your work with DePaul first year students who are actively discerning and envisioning their future academic and work careers, I wanted to be sure you knew that author/researcher Dr. Tim Clydesdale will be coming to DePaul on Friday, February 19th, 9:00-10:30 a.m. in Room 120 of the Lincoln Park Student Center to discuss with us the results and insights from his latest book, The Purposeful Graduate: Why Colleges Must Talk to Students about Vocation. The program is made possible by a Vincentian Endowment Fund grant.

Dr. Clydesdale is coming to DePaul in support of the new Vincentian Values and Vision (V3) initiative at DePaul, which is focused on encouraging wider student and institutional engagement (faculty, staff, alumni) around "purpose exploration" consistent with our Vincentian mission. In November 2015, DePaul was one of 20 institutions awarded a Network for Vocation in Undergraduate Education (NetVUE) Program Development Grant of \$50,000 to implement this V3 initiative.

As we work to imagine and implement the Vincentian Values and Vision (V3) initiative at DePaul, we anticipate that we will gain a wealth of knowledge and counsel from Dr. Clydesdale, who is a (if not the) leading expert on the implementation of these types of purpose/vocation-oriented programs on college campuses nationally.
